Dear Friends,

It is my pleasure to welcome you to Great Smoky Mountains Institute at Tremont, where we have been conducting Road Scholar (Elderhostel) programs in the national park since 1986. We look forward to spending a week with you full of fellowship, learning, beautiful scenery, adventure and delicious food!

Below you will find a good deal of information NOT contained in the packet sent to you by Road Scholar. Please read it thoroughly! Please fill out the <u>Participant Information Form</u> found on the Road Scholar website; alternately, you may fill out the 4-page hard copy of the <u>Participant Information Form</u> in the back of the packet sent to you by Road Scholar and send it to us directly. We also ask you to fill out the <u>Travel Plans & Waiver</u> (Tremont document) and send it to us directly. **Both the <u>Travel Plans & Waiver</u> and the <u>Participant Information Form</u> should be submitted by March 23rd.**

Plan to **arrive** here on **Sunday, April 8** between 3:00 and 5:00 PM for check-in. There will be time to settle into the dorm before dinner, which is served at 6:00 PM.

If you're arriving by plane or bus, the Knoxville airport is 45 minutes from us. The nearest bus service is one hour away in Knoxville. We can arrange a shuttle pick-up provided you request it in advance. Shuttle fee is \$40 round trip for the airport and \$50 round trip for the bus station, payable in advance to *Tremont*.

Should you choose Tremont as your taxi service from the airport, we cannot guarantee pick up at the exact time of your arrival. Some period of waiting is virtually guaranteed. Pick-ups generally take place between 1:30 and 5:00 PM. In order to make as few airport trips as possible, we generally wait until three or more participants have arrived before we make a pickup. If you wish instead to hire an independent taxi service from the airport, you are responsible for making those arrangements yourself. In this event, please make note on the <u>Travel Plans & Waiver form that you are traveling by automobile.</u>

Weather:

The weather here is usually pleasant in April. For the last four years, the month of April has been characterized by an average daily high of 74°F. and an average daily low of 42°F. Keep in mind, however, that some hikes will take you through higher elevations, which can sometimes mean a difference of 15°F cooler, or more. Also, the Smokies are a very wet and humid climate; rain is virtually guaranteed at some point during your stay here. Rain gear is always necessary in the Smokies. We will carry it at all times!

In addition to items on the packing list Road Scholar provides, you may choose to bring any of the following items:

- trekking poles for stream crossings and rocky trails
- reading lamp—to use in our dormitory after "lights out"
- mattress pad—our dormitory beds are firm!
- extra blanket for the dormitory (in addition to the one provided by us)

• adult beverages—the nearest place to purchase wine is in Maryville, TN, 25 minutes away

Lodging:

We're sorry but individual rooms are not available in our rustic, bunkroom-style dormitory. The dormitory is separated by a men's side and a women's side. (Toilets and showers are separate.) Sheets, a blanket, a pillow, towels and washcloths will be provided for you. If you have any concerns regarding these particular items, please feel free to call. We ask that you please store any personal food items in your vehicle and do not bring food into the dorm.

Cell phone service is generally not available in the mountains. However, we do have a landline available for your use in our Activity Center, where wifi is usually available as well.

Schedule:

Please note that the schedule included in the Road Scholar packet is tentative. A final schedule will be made available for you upon arrival. You will have three hikes to choose from each day. All hikes are challenging and are rated moderate to strenuous. Hikes are generally between 5 miles minimum to about 13 miles in length. Occasionally, a hike will have a theme (examples: geology, cultural history, wildflowers, etc.). Be forewarned: the most challenging hikes have early morning departure times to help ensure a timely return back to campus. Trails with flat ground virtually do not exist in the Smoky Mountains! Expect steep uphill and downhill hiking, rocky terrain, and river crossings with or without bridges even on hikes rated "easy." We will take a moderate pace. Our purpose is to learn about the Smokies by interpreting the natural and cultural history along the way. We want it to be a safe and enjoyable experience for you. Drive times to trailheads vary between 15 minutes to 1 hour in length.

In the evening, we'll relax at Tremont with dinner followed by a short program or presentation. Appalachian songs and stories, an evening around the campfire, and Smoky Mountain natural and cultural history are a few examples of our evening offerings.

The program **ends** on **Friday**, **April 13** following breakfast. The return shuttle to the airport and bus service will be offered at this time. We apologize, but lodging will not be available prior to or following the program dates.

PLEASE NOTE: **March 23** is the deadline for us to receive your <u>Travel Plans & Waiver</u> AND the 4-page <u>Participant Information Form</u> found at the back of the packet sent to you by Road Scholar.
