


BACKCOUNTRY EXPERIENCES

Wilderness Adventure Trek – June 8-13 & 22-27 | \$992

Learn the skills necessary to plan and enjoy a safe, successful back-packing trip with Tremont's experienced hiking guides. Before you know it, you'll be climbing a mountain, carrying everything you need to survive in the wilderness for four days and three nights. Ages 13-17.

Backcountry Ecological Expedition

June 22-27 | \$1,045

Travel to relatively undisturbed areas of the park to conduct field experiments and record your scientific observations. You'll explore creeks and hollows in search of the next organism new to the park – or even to science! Ages 13-17.

Teen High Adventure — July 13-23 | \$1,917

Spend six nights and seven days backpacking in the national park's beautiful backcountry. You will be amazed at the skills and confidence you gain from this wild adventure. Ages 13-17.

Whether you're starting with one class or aiming for full certification, you'll join a community of learners guided by Tremont faculty, guest researchers, and National Park professionals.

Naturalist Skills

Jan. 30-Feb. 1 & Sep. 25-27

Step into the role of a naturalist and uncover the techniques that bring the outdoors into sharper focus.

Skills for Sharing Nature - Feb. 13-15

Engage others in the wonder of the outdoors to inspire curiosity and meaningful connection.

Birds of the Smokies – May 8-10

Immerse yourself in the vibrant world of birds, learning to identify species by sight, sound, and behavior.

Plants of the Smokies – May 8-10

Connect with native plants up close. Recognize species by their traits and uncover their ecological role.

Reptiles & Amphibians – Jun. 19-21

Explore streams, wetlands, and forest floors to get to know salamanders, frogs, snakes, lizards and turtles.

Winter Woody Plant ID – Jan. 31 | \$99

Identify trees and shrubs even when leaves are long gone, using bark, buds, and branch structure as your guide.

Likin' Lichens — Feb. 13-15 | \$555

Get eye-level with lichens to uncover their fascinating forms, survival strategies, and role as indicators of environmental health.

Geology — Nov. 6-8 | \$555

Trace the story of the Smokies written in stone – from ancient sea floors to uplifted peaks – and see how geology shapes every living thing here.



Forest Stewardship with Elizabeth Feb. 7 | \$90

Learn to read the winter forest, care for hemlocks, and use traditional tools as you deepen your skills in forest stewardship and contribute to the health of our second campus.

Wayfinding with Kathleen Mar. 14 | \$90



At Tremont, education is immersive. It's about stepping beyond conventional boundaries, venturing into the outdoors, and igniting a cascade of inquiries. This isn't just learning – it's a dynamic process of engaging with the world.

Our distinctive approach involves residential trips spanning 3 to 5 days, during which students become inhabitants and explorers of the national park. Guided by an accomplished faculty of dedicated educators, our curriculum aligns with academic standards, imparting not just skills and knowledge, but also nurturing inquisitiveness and critical thinking.

- Help students build critical thinking skills, scientific literacy, and a love for learning
- Challenge teachers and students to develop personal and meaningful connections to the land and to each other



COOPERATIVE TEACHING

Cooperative teaching is a team-teaching approach that provides opportunities to connect subjects and standards from the classroom to hands-on lessons at Tremont. We plan to show what is possible when we build with intention – places that inspire connection with each other and the natural world.


